Central Contractor Registry (CCR)

Any organization wishing to do business with the Federal Government is required to register with the Central Contractor Registry (CCR) at <http://www.bpn.gov/ccr/>. Once you have accessed the website, you can read a guide about the registration process, frequently asked questions, and instructions for creating a user ID and password by clicking on the “Help” link on the top right of the page. It will tell you all the information you will need to register. To begin your registration go to the CCR Home page and select the “Start a New Registration” button within the “Create a New Registration” section. Small Businesses should also complete the Small Business Administration’s (SBA) Supplemental Page at the end of the registration.

CLU-IN Federal Business Opportunities (FedBizOpps)

The Federal Business Opportunities website is the single government point-of-entry for Federal government contract opportunities over \$30,000. Managed by the General Services Administration, it allows businesses to sign up for e-mail notification of open contracts related to specified fields. The Federal Business Opportunities (FedBizOpps) website on EPA’s CLU-IN website (<http://www.cluin.org/fedbizopps/>) contains summaries of the procurement and contract award notices that pertain to hazardous waste, solid waste, underground storage tank remediation, and other

environmental topics. However, it does not necessarily contain EVERY notice on these topics. Notices issued between November 7-11, 2011, are currently available (updated weekly). View and subscribe to the CLU-IN subset of notices at <http://www.cluin.org/newsletters/>.

CLU-IN Vendors & Developers

The Vendors & Developers website on the CLU-IN website (<http://www.clu-in.org/vendor/>) provides technology developers and vendors with tools to help advance technologies through all stages of product development from bench scale to full commercialization. The materials cover a broad range of topics that include business planning, marketing, financing, and technical issues and sources.

Each section addresses a particular group of activities that lead to the advancement of a technology from the germination of an idea to research, development, testing, and finally to commercial application.

Doing Business with EPA, U.S. EPA Office of Acquisition Management (OAM)

The Office of Acquisition Management (OAM) is responsible for all contracting and related activities to fulfill the Agency's mission to protect and safeguard the environment through its business relationships. The OAM Acquisition Management website (<http://www.epa.gov/oam/>) provides Business Opportunities (federal procurement announcements, downloadable solicitations, etc.); EPA Acquisition Resources (e.g., EPA's Acquisition Forecasts, EPA Procurement Policies); and Other Items of Interest (e.g., EPA's Current Contracts List, the Federal Acquisition Virtual Library).

Contract Opportunities Under Superfund

Subcontracting opportunities are available under several current Superfund contracts. The contracts fall into the following six basic categories: [Removal Action](#), [Remedial Response](#), [Support Services](#), [Technical Enforcement Support](#), [Policy, Program Management, and Administrative Services](#), and [Other Contract Venues](#). - **Removal Action:** Contracts to provide EPA regional offices with (1) technical and management assistance for the removal action program financed by the Hazardous Substance Response Trust Fund, the corrective action program financed by the (Leaking) Underground Storage Tank (UST) Trust Fund, and the Oil Spill Prevention Program under the Clean Water Act and (2) cleanup

personnel, equipment, and materials for the removal program and corrective actions financed by the (LUST) UST Trust Fund.

- **Remedial Response:** Contracts to provide EPA regional offices with technical assistance and resources for remedial investigation and feasibility studies; engineering services to design remedial actions; engineering evaluations and cost analyses for non-time critical removal actions, including issuing and managing subcontracts for construction of the selected remedy, and engineering services for construction oversight. Enforcement support is also provided with the oversight of the remedial investigations/feasibility studies, remedial designs, and remedial actions, and negotiation support; and other technical assistance, including community relations, sampling and analytical support, and pre-design investigations.

- **Technical Enforcement Support:** Contracts to provide technical support to EPA Headquarters and regional personnel to enforce CERCLA and the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA).

- **Regional Oversight Contract (ROC):** These contracts provide technical support to EPA in fulfillment of its responsibilities for oversight and enforcement of both CERCLA and RCRA activities at active, closed, or former Federal facilities, including Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) installations, Formerly Used Defense Sites (FUDS), and Formerly Used Site Remedial Action Program (FUSRAP) sites. To a much lesser extent, the contract may also be used to provide technical support to EPA non-Federal potentially responsible party (PRP)-lead (i.e., privately-owned) sites. The U.S. government operates thousands of facilities across the country that promote the security and welfare of American Citizens, such as nuclear weapons plants, military bases, and fuel distribution stations. After years of vital service and operation, many of these Federal facilities are contaminated with military munitions, hazardous substances, hazardous waste, radioactive waste, and other toxic substances. To address the challenges posed by contamination at these facilities, the EPA works with the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD), Department of ENERGY (DOE), and other Federal entities to develop solutions to their environmental problems.

- **Other Contract Venues:** State leads, under Cooperative Agreements, in which the State performs work with its own resources, or by contracting for needed goods and services with private firms. Also, EPA, in a cooperative effort involving a broad spectrum of government and private parties, coordinates all actions in preventing and preparing for oils spills to improve the effectiveness of oil spill responses.

Brownfields Cleanup Opportunities

EPA's Brownfields Program provides direct funding for brownfields assessment, cleanup, revolving loans, and environmental job training. To facilitate the leveraging of public resources, EPA's Brownfields Program collaborates with other EPA programs, other federal partners, and state agencies to identify and make available resources that can be used for brownfields activities. In addition to direct brownfields funding, EPA also provides technical information on brownfields financing matters.

The grant funding and direct assistance (through Agency contract support) will result in an area-wide plan which will inform the assessment, cleanup and reuse of brownfields properties and promote area-wide revitalization.
- [Assessment Grants](#)
Assessment grants provide funding for a grant recipient to inventory, characterize, assess, and conduct planning and community involvement related to brownfield sites.
- [Revolving Loan Fund Grants](#)
The purpose of Revolving Loan Fund Grants is to enable States, political subdivisions, and Indian tribes to make low interest loans to carryout cleanup activities at brownfields properties.
- [Cleanup Grants](#)
Cleanup grants provide funding for a grant recipient to carry out cleanup activities at brownfield sites.
- [Job Training Grants](#)
Job Training Grants are designed to provide funding to eligible entities, including nonprofit

organizations, to recruit, train, and place, predominantly low-income and minority, unemployed and under-employed residents of brownfields-impacted communities with the skills needed to secure full-time, sustainable, employment in the environmental field and in the assessment and cleanup work taking place in their communities.

Training, Research, and Technical Assistance Grants provide funding to eligible organizations to provide training, research, and technical assistance to facilitate brownfields revitalization.
- [Targeted Brownfields Assessments](#)
The Targeted Brownfields Assessment (TBA) program is designed to help states, tribes, and municipalities—especially those without EPA Brownfields Assessment Pilots/Grants—minimize the uncertainties of contamination often associated with brownfields.

Brownfields grant applicants are encouraged to work with local community groups and local businesses to complete brownfields cleanup and assessment. A list of brownfields grants awarded in Regions 1, 2, and 3 in 2010 and 2011 are shown below. This information can be leveraged by small businesses to locate opportunities to assist local communities and participate in their brownfield projects. Small business owners should work with local government to ensure they are aware of potential cleanup business opportunities.

The Department of Defense's (DoD) Office of Small Business Programs (<http://www.acq.osd.mil/osbp/>) is committed to maximizing the contributions of small business in DoD acquisitions. Its mission is to:

- Advise the Secretary of Defense on all matters related to small business.
- Represent the Secretary of Defense on major small business matters addressed at the OSD level.
- Develop DoD-wide small business policy and provide oversight to ensure compliance by all military departments and defense agencies.
- Provide Military Departments, Defense Agencies, and Procurement Technical Assistance Centers (PTACs) with training and tools to foster an environment that encourages small business participation in defense acquisition.

Air Force Center for Engineering and the Environment (AFCEE)

The Air Force Center for Engineering and the Environment (AFCEE) has a Technology Transfer program, which identifies environmental needs of the Air Force and provides technical expertise to evaluate, demonstrate, and apply innovative technologies. AFCEE conducts field demonstrations, publishes the results, and facilitates regulatory acceptance of a technology. U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Environmental Programs Contracting Opportunities

The US Army Corps of Engineers supports all four pillars of the Army's Environmental Strategy into the 21st Century: 1) Restoration; 2) Compliance; 3) Prevention; and 4) Conservation. The Corps provides comprehensive environmental services to the Army, DoD, EPA, Department of Energy (DOE), and other federal agencies. Besides cleaning up sites contaminated with hazardous waste, radioactive waste, and/or unexploded ordnance, USACE: assists installations and other customers in complying with federal, state, and local environmental laws and regulations; strives to minimize use of hazardous materials; and works hard at assisting in conserving natural and cultural resources.

The USACE specializes in study, design, remedial action (construction), project management, research, development, and technology transfer. It has an aggressive innovative technology program and is continually developing innovative contract vehicles.

The Corps supports the following environmental programs: the Formerly Used Defense Sites (FUDS), Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC), Army Installation Restoration Program (IRP), Air Force IRP, Defense Logistics Agency IRP, Environmental Quality (compliance, pollution prevention and conservation), EPA Superfund Program, Environmental Support for Others (ESFO), and Overseas Environmental programs.

Department of Energy E-Center

The Corps of Engineers uses its engineering and contracting capabilities to support FEMA and other Federal, State and local government agencies in a wide variety of missions during natural and man-made disasters.

Information in this registry will be used by Corps of Engineers offices that are looking for specific goods or services during emergencies. Submission of information is voluntary. Information will be considered For Official Use Only within the Federal government. Submission of information to this registry DOES NOT expressly or implicitly commit the Federal government to procurement of products or services
